It is also that time of year we assess the past seasons, count our blessings and give thanks for all that you, our rowing stewards, alumni and friends, continue to do for Washington Rowing.

We are especially grateful for your extraordinary generosity this year:

- Generous donors paid \$317,600 to many of our 42 endowments.
- Two new endowments were established: The Title IX Legacy and The Boys in the Boat.
- Two new eights The Brett "Big Red" Reisinger (140 donors!) and the Kit Green.
- Forty-five student-athletes experienced The Henley Royal Regatta.

- We raised \$88,000 from 138 gifts, the most money raised of all the sports on Husky Giving Day last spring.



#### UW WOMEN'S ROWER CLAIRE MARION IS A TESTAMENT TO STRENGTH AND BALANCE

ifth-year senior **Claire Marion** believes there's a ■ 100% chance of improvement with every workout if you just push yourself.

"That's something my freshman coach, Maggie Phillips '17, said to us and it really stuck with me; it's especially true when you're just starting to row," Claire recalls.

Though she initially chose the University of Washington for its highly ranked Bioengineering program, Claire soon found herself trying out for, and earning a place on, the Washington Rowing team.

"I like the team dynamics and getting to know other people with a united goal," she says. "It offered more opportunities to push my limits and see what I'm capable of doing."

sophomore year. Being able to have successful surgeries and come back and be able to reenter the rowing world was super awesome."

After Claire's successful rebound from injury she earned a seat in the 2021 Pac-12 Champion third varsity eight, helping Washington win its fourth consecutive Pac-12

> Team Championship. Claire has been named to the Pac-12 Spring Academic Honor Roll twice and was named a 2022 College Rowing Coaches Association (CRCA) Scholar-Athlete. Last spring, en route to graduating with departmental honors, Claire was featured on UW's Department of Bioengineering website for her perseverance and discipline in managing her degree, volunteering at Swedish Hospital and rowing.

> "It's a nice acknowledgment of all the time and effort that it took to succeed in both realms of academics and sports. I'm not doing it for the recognition, but it's a nice little reward!" the California native says.

Stronger than ever, Claire is grateful for the support she has gained from the team, her family and the donors.

"I just want to personally thank the donors so much," she says. "Their support certainly elevated my experience here and has given us state-of-the-art equipment and incredible resources."

Claire looks forward to applying her grit, determination and gratitude as she fulfills her medical school prerequisites and competes in her fifth and final season as a Woman of Washington.

Balancing life on a champion rowing team with dreams of being a doctor has required discipline and perseverance, especially when Claire was faced with her own medical challenge.

"I ended up having exertional compartment syndrome in both of my forearms. That was impactful because I was injured for most of my



# **Hungry Humble Husky**

DONOR SUPPORT ENABLES JACK WALKEY TO QUIETLY REWRITE THE RECORD BOOKS

s a child growing up in Victoria, British Columbia, Jack Walkey dreamed of moving to the U.S. to play sports. Thanks to the generous support of Washington Rowing donors, that dream led him to the University of Washington and a championship journey at the national and international level alongside Husky teammates.

"I can't express how much I appreciate the people who donate to Washington Rowing," Jack says. "My scholarship donors are the only reason I'm here. They're friends for *life.* So many of our donors show up for BBOs and races. It's really a family. The support I feel is hard to put into words."

Jack's humble nature keeps him from sharing too much about his accomplishments, which include winning the 2021 IRA National Championship in the varsity eight, winning the 2021 Head of the Charles in the Championship Eight event and setting a course record in the Visitors' Challenge Cup at Henley Royal Regatta this past summer. Add to that a 2021 World Championship crown for Canada in the U23 Men's four with Husky boatmates Adam Krol '22 and Peter Lancashire '21, coached by UW assistant coach Sergio Espinoza.

But lack doesn't shy away from expressing his gratitude toward

everyone who has helped him in his rowing journey, especially Men's Rowing Head Coach Michael Callahan. "I look up to him so much; it's hard to explain. He brings a level of excellence to everything."

lack is also thankful for his teammates. "They're such a remarkable group of dedicated, hard-working guys. There's a defining culture of inspiration and motivation; it's an exceptional place," Jack says.

In a group of 50 men competing against one another, they all recognize at the end of the day they're in the same boat, he adds. "We're all fighting for seats, but we settle it out on the water. There's never any animosity; we come together for dinner and simply enjoy each other."



Aside from receiving an amazing education, Jack believes time management is something the UW has helped him master. By finding calm in the chaos, Jack can manage his studies, nutrition and competing — skills that will benefit him in future endeavors.

"I'll be graduating in the spring, and there seems to be this pressure of having the next thing lined up; I'm confident that whatever I pursue, I'm well prepared," he notes.

Although Jack isn't overthinking his next steps, he likes the idea of possibly doing search and rescue; something that matches the excitement and challenges of his time at the UW.

Of all 22 Husky teams, Rowing finished first in total dollars raised and third in number of gifts.



**Living the Legacy** 

PRIZE RECRUIT JENNI HOGAN PAYS IT FORWARD

teenager growing up in Adelaide, Australia, Jenni **Hogan** was originally a basketball player — until Australia won the bid for the 2000 Olympic Games. A national search for Olympic hopefuls and future gold medalists was underway. Jenni eagerly embraced a series of athletic tests designed to determine which athletes were best suited for each Olympic sport. Her physiology and extra-long arm span sealed the deal. Jenni became a rower.

At 18, Jenni earned a spot on the Australian team invited to participate in the Windermere Cup at Washington. Standing on the Montlake Bridge and gazing into the storied Cut, she was offered a life-changing full-ride scholarship from UW coach Eleanor McElvaine. Ienni moved to Seattle with \$2,000 to her name that she had saved from her job waiting tables and her journey as a Husky began.

The first six months of Jenni's time at the UW were challenging. She wasn't accustomed to losing and realized she had to adjust her mindset. "Once I discovered the only right way is your team's way, that's when I started winning again," the 2002 graduate says.



As one of 80 women in the trenches working hard and sacrificing for the benefit of two boats, the team culture soon became ingrained in Jenni, who became team captain her senior year.

"I learned about being competitive with yourself — always pushing that edge to improve, and then elevating those around you to do better," she explains. That mindset helped Jenni and her teammates win four consecutive Pac-10 Conference Championships and two NCAA titles.

Jenni embeds that collaborative philosophy into her work life and has remained steadfast in uplifting those around her. She is a successful entrepreneur with several businesses of her own.

Jenni emphasizes the power of being part of the Washington Women's Rowing alumni network.



"It feels like a big family; they'll always be there

for you," Jenni smiles. "Even after you leave it's something you think about every day. That level of excellence becomes part of who you are; it doesn't feel like a choice."

While at the UW, Jenni made it her goal to donate a boat one day.


"When I first saw the caliber of resources the UW had at its disposal, it was jawdropping. I was used to these old wooden boats. It made me realize how much we rely on donations and the alumni for equipment," She says. Twenty years later, Jenni has reached her goal. Her \$50,000 donation to the Title IX Legacy endowment will support the women's team operating budget. A newly crafted boat will be commissioned in May and carry her name.

In a parting word for future donors, Jenni's advice is to "sit with what's right for you, but don't put it off. Life's too short to wait."

hen the wind's against you, when your opponent inches ahead, when you think you have nothing left to give ... you persevere and push through. And if you're one of the mighty women of Washington, you emerge ever stronger. Those qualities of resilience, strength and tenacity are part of the legacy of our program. And so are you.

Over the past year, despite the chaos of a (hopefully) waning pandemic, our Washington Rowing community remained steadfastly by our side. Your support enabled us to transcend the tough times and to overcome adversity like generations of Husky rowers have done before us. We gained strength from you. We persevered because of you. We were filled with gratitude to have the best boathouse, the best rowing setting and the best donors and fans who stand with us, win or lose. Thank you.

As we look ahead to the new season, we're already off to an incredible start! Our young team finished third among 29 boats in the Championship Eights at the Head of the Charles Regatta in October. With a record-high 17 graduates last year — including half the squad who competed in the NCAA championships — our lack of veteran rowers is balanced by the team's unwavering commitment and belief in each other. As fifth year coxswain Nina Castagna said after the Head of the Charles race:

"In our minds, today was the first chance for us to show what the Women of Washington are looking to do this year. We've got a young team and have only been together about a month now, so we know there's plenty of work to do, but that doesn't make today any less exciting. There wasn't any big move in the middle to speed us up, just a true commitment to each other that helped drive us to the line. We're hoping to continue to strengthen that commitment this season so that we can do

> something extraordinary with the rest of this year.'

Veterans like Nina and co-commodores McKenna Bryant '22 and Tory Park '23 bring great leadership to all the enthusiastic underclasswomen and walk-ons on our team. Our youth is no roadblock to building a winning culture in Conibear and developing championship boats.

We also remain cognizant that every successful Washington woman rower today stands on the shoulders of the sisterhood of years past. During this yearlong celebration of Title IX, every time we race, our boat names will celebrate your contributions and those women who helped create the opportunities we have today. From the Title IX Sisterhood and Title IX Legacy (both donated and inspired by the Women of the 70s), to the Dottie Simpson, Kit Green and Jenni Hogan, we will honor the contributions of all the women who came before us. We will persevere because you showed us how.



A Tradition of Innovation

see the Husky Clipper — the shell the "Boys in the Boat" rowed to Olympic victory — every day. The boat hangs from the rafters of Conibear Shellhouse, a reminder of the beauty of rowing, the individual character built through the sport and the teamwork that binds our generations together.

The historic shell is also a reminder of something else: innovation. George Pocock built the shell in 1936; when it came out of his shop there was nothing in the world like it. Lighter and stronger than other racing shells, it captured crowds when it was unwrapped in Berlin. George Pocock's legacy as an innovator and global leader is still an integral part of Washington Rowing and who we are today.

This legacy continued with Hiram Conibear — our founder. The inventor of the "Conibear stroke," Coach Conibear never stopped pushing limits. It was he who

introduced women to Washington Rowing in 1903, decades before our competitors even admitted women to their schools. Positive change was a constant with Coach Conibear, and I can only imagine the iov he would find in celebrating the 50th anniversary of Title IX and the incredible, unmatched history of our Washington women's program.

Today, the collegiate sports landscape is changing, and we need to change with it. We need to beat our competitors by introducing new strategies in recruiting communications, opening access to academic opportunities for

top-level students and focusing our budget on scholarships for young people who represent our program and its ethos.

Our willingness to innovate cannot stop at recruiting. We must continue to lead the country in the development and promotion of rowing. Previous gifts from our community have given us many firsts: our state-of-the-art starting platform, leading-edge digital/drone coverage for races, high-tech post-practice compression recovery sleeves, the Windermere Cup night sprints, and constant evaluation technology for maximizing coxswain/rower/coach communication. In many of these examples, we either designed and/ or developed technology ourselves or were early adopters. In every case, our ability to lead and innovate was partially or fully funded through gifts. We need your help this year to continue to innovate at this level.

We — as a team and community committed to this program do not sit still. We don't wait to see what others do. We take on challenges and lead. That is our tradition of innovation, and we do it together. Thank you for being a big part of who we are and supporting this program that binds us together through tradition and the continued drive toward excellence on and off the water.

## "Boys In the Boat" Movie Update




